

“The Student Right to Know and Campus Security Act of 1990 (recently renamed the Clery Act)”

This law requires all higher education institutions to collect and publish crime statistics. All occurrences that endanger the lives and well being of our students should be reported immediately to the Dean of Student Services.

Trinidad State Junior College strives to create and maintain a learning environment that is safe and accessible. Campus safety is the responsibility of all members of the Trinidad State Junior College community.

As members of our TSJC community, you should:

- Always lock your car when leaving the parking lot to go to class.
- Always check your vehicle prior to unlocking and entering.
- Walk out of class in groups or pairs. Get to know your classmates!
- Walk in well-lit areas.
- Report any suspicious activity; please report it immediately to the Student Services Office, VC 160. (719)589-7000.
- Don't leave personal belongings unattended; e.g. purses, keys, or backpacks.
- Pay close attention to the physical characteristics of the individual(s) involved in any altercation or incident. If the incident involves a car, try to get the license plate number, also the make and model of the car.

Through collaboration of all members of the campus, we can create and maintain an environment that is safe for all of us.

Campus Security

Trinidad State Junior College will strive to make its facility a reasonably secure place for all members of the campus community. Trinidad State Junior College provides its students and employees with a level of security equal to that afforded throughout the Alamosa community. The College does not provide an armed security force.

Administrative Responsibility

Administrative responsibility for Trinidad State Junior College security is assigned to the Student Services Office, under the supervision of the Dean (719) 589-7050.

Institutional personnel are available on campus and prepared to respond to and make reports of criminal activity or other emergency situations which arise.

Security risks due to design, maintenance, or operation of buildings, grounds or equipment shall be promptly identified and corrected. Should an incident occur, security will identify the appropriate action and coordinates implementation of the solution with the President, Vice Presidents, and Deans of the College.

Building Access

The College campus is open under normal work hours. After hours, College personal have limited access to facilities as needed. Any college student desiring use of College facilities beyond normal work hours must obtain written approval for use of facilities from the Student Services Office, VC 160. (719)589-7000.

Reporting of Criminal Action or Emergencies

To report any criminal actions or other emergencies occurring on campus during normal work hours, as defined, notify the Dean of Student Services (719-589-7050). After normal work hours call 911. The call will be investigated and appropriate action will be taken.

Trinidad State Junior College is a drug free campus. As a drug free campus it is illegal to use, distribute or sell drugs on the premises of this campus. People who are suspected of intoxication by alcohol or drugs should be referred to the office of Student Services, VC 160. If a determination is made that an individual is using drugs or alcohol on campus, or coming to campus intoxicated, the individual could be suspended and/or face a legal penalties according to law. Alcohol and drug use can have severe consequences both educationally and personally. If you know of someone, or personally have a drug/alcohol problem, please contact Student Services for information about referrals to agencies that can assist you.

Drug & Alcohol Policy

Trinidad State Junior College is a state system community college governed by the State Board for Community Colleges and Occupational Education (“Board”). The board policy requires the College to comply with the Drug Free Schools and Communities Amendments of 1989 (PL 101-226 in Federal Law).

Standards of Conduct

Students and employees shall not engage in the unauthorized or unlawful manufacture, distribution, dispensation, possession, use/abuse of alcohol and/or illicit drugs on College property, or use a part of College activities.

Legal Sanctions for Violation of the Standards of Conduct

Any student or employee who is convicted of the unlawful manufacture, distribution, dispensation, possession, use/abuse of illicit drugs or alcohol is subject to criminal penalties under local, state and federal law. These penalties range in severity from a fine of up to \$100 to life imprisonment. The exact penalty assessed depends upon the nature and severity of the individual offense.

Penalties Which May be Imposed by the College

Students and/or employees who violate the above standard of conduct will be subject to disciplinary sanctions. The sanctions include, but are not limited to, a requirement to complete an appropriate rehabilitation or re-entry program; expulsion from College or termination of employment; and/or referral to authorities for prosecution.

Health Risks Associated with Use of Illicit Drugs and Alcohol

Health risks associated with drug and alcohol abuse include, but are not limited to, malnutrition, brain damage, heart damage, pancreatitis, cirrhosis of the liver, mental illness, death, low birth weight babies, and babies with drug addictions.

Available Information, Counseling, Treatment, Rehabilitation or Re-Entry Programs

A copy of the list identifying which drugs are illicit may be reviewed at the Student Services Office. In addition, information on available counseling, treatment, and rehabilitation or re-entry programs is available at the Counseling Office of the Colorado Department of Health.

Sexual Assault Information

Students and/or employees who experience a sexual assault on/off the TSJC campus should immediately report the incident to Alamosa Police Department by calling 911

Preserve Evidence

A victim of a sexual assault should make every effort to preserve all evidence so that the law enforcement officers can present as strong a case as possible. Reporting an assault is a **MUST!** Try to note any distinguishing characteristics of the person who assaulted you.

Community Resources

Victims of sexual assault can receive crisis intervention and referral services from Alternatives to Violence/SLV Mental Health Center (719) 589-3671.
