# Antonette Lane is Leaving

After 20 years of service, a rock solid constant is retiring from Trinidad State Jr. College's Alamosa Campus.

Antonette Lane began working at TSJC Valley Campus on August 21, 1989, back when the school was still the San Luis Valley Area Vocational School.

"I have been here 20 years. I have worked under 5 different administrations. I started back when the computers were all using Word Perfect and Lotus 1-2-3. It has been a wonderful time. I enjoy what I do"

After raising their family in Pueblo, Antonette and her husband Keith moved to the Valley. Two years later, Antonette started working at the school. Many fond memories have been made in the twenty years that followed.

"I've known her for 20 years. She was my recommendation for hire. She's honest, and compassionate. The other day I forgot her birthday and I asked her 'How long have we been together? I think that make us common law!', and we had a good laugh about that." ~Rosalie Ortega, Co-worker

"I've known her for 17 years. She cares about us. She is very discerning; you can't pull the wool over her eyes. She is also an avid Broncos fan. My husband stops by the college just to talk with her about football." ~Mathilda Westerman

When we asked Antonette what she would miss the most after retiring, she said:

"I think its all the people I work with. They are like my second family. A couple of people have been here as long as I have, or even longer. We're very close. The staff is very good. There' very supportive. They've put up with me all these years. (Laugh) I think that is what I will miss the most. All the people that I work with... (Sniff) I enjoy what I do."

But what will Antonette do after retirement?

"Probably try to do a little bit of traveling, my husband and I. We're going to probably get our house ready for sale, because we hope to move back to Pueblo. Our kids are there. My sister is there. I have a niece and a grandniece and our grandnephews, and our grandson there. So we want to move

back to be closer to the family."

Fishing and camping are also at the top of the list. "We do a lot of fishing and camping. We love to camp and fish."

But Antonette will be sorely missed here at TSJC. She can't come back to work for one month after her last day here on Friday, October 30, 2009. After that month, though, she has agreed to come back and help out with the workload, and to train her replacement.

As one of my last questions, I had to ask what advice Mrs. Lane would give to the student body here at TSJC. This was her reply:

"Stay in school. Work as hard as you can. If you're having a problem, make sure you talk to your instructor, and get it resolved. I think that one of the best things about Trinidad State is that we are small enough that everybody gets a lot of individual attention. And I think that makes our students successful."

A scrumptious lunch was held Friday in the Valley Campus Atrium to honor Antonette and her 20 years. Members of her family and many of the faculty and staff were present. Recently installed TSJC Interim President Felix Lopez and Trinidad Staff were unable to attend due to bad weather.

# Student Intern Success!

Emelia Lujan is going to school for free and getting paid to work near home.

How did she get such a sweet deal? She is a hard worker for one. That was what prompted Lujan's professor to ask her if she would be interested in an internship. But this was no regular internship. This internship would be a paid internship at 6 credit hours.

"Most of our internships are un-paid, as well as being only 3 credit hours long. Most companies around here just can't do more than that. But with monies coming in from the current administration, Conejos County was able to work this out." – Victor Salazar, Career Services

Emelia Lujan is very grateful for the opportunity that this internship has given her.

"I am getting paid for my work, and I am getting an opportunity to show my abilities. The work I do for the intern also counts toward my school credits."

In her second year at TSJC, Lujan is majoring in Business Technologies. She plans to continue her education and get a degree in Business Management.

"I was scared at first... coming back to school. I started working in the fields (lettuce, potato) when I was fourteen. I got married when I was seventeen. Then we moved away and it was twenty years before I came back. I knew almost nothing about the computers. Now I know a lot."

Not only has Emelia learned how to use such programs as Excel, Microsoft Word, and PowerPoint, but she has also learned a lot about Graphic Design.

"I use these programs often. Ten key, graphs, and Excel help a lot."

Emelia's intern is located at the Conejos County Commissioners administrative office, where she handles

accounting and payroll.

"I am using their accounting program, typing up letters, as well as attending administrative meetings.

"Coming to school pays off. My sister and I worked in the fields. Then I worked in a grocery store. Now as a single parent, I'm attending college, working two jobs, and raising my two children, a 15 year-old son and a 7 year-old daughter. When I graduate, I would like to be employed as an office assistant for the Conejos County Commissioner's office. Ironically, my goal before I even started my college degree was to be employed at the Conejos County Courthouse. Thanks to TSJC and Janet DuPont, I am on my way to accomplishing my dream for a secure and well-paying job." – Emelia Lujan

The Friday after thanksgiving is the Busiest shopping day of the year. It's Called Black Friday

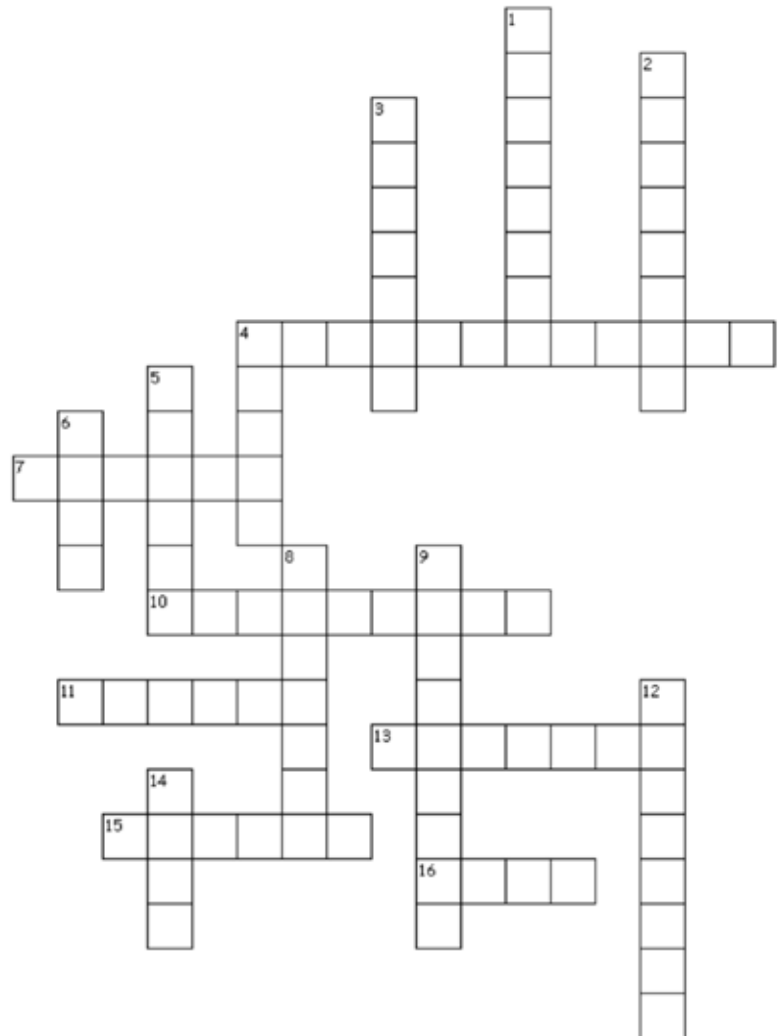

ASIST is designed to help all caregivers become more willing, ready and able to help persons at risk. Suicide can be prevented with the help of prepared caregivers.

Just as "CPR" skills make physical first aid possible, training in suicide intervention develops the skills used in suicide first aid. ASIST is a two-day intensive, interactive and practice-dominated course designed to help caregivers recognize risk and learn how to intervene to prevent the immediate risk of suicide.

The workshop is for all caregivers (any person in a position of trust). This includes professionals, paraprofessionals and lay people. It is suitable for mental health professionals, nurses, physicians, pharmacists, teachers, counselors, youth workers, police and correctional staff, school support staff, clergy, and community volunteers.
