Certificate in Family Mediation

This course will provide you with the skill set needed to become a Family Mediator. You will receive training in the Mediators Without Borders INACCORD® conflict resolution model. You will learn special skills necessary for mediating familial disputes and parent-child issues, including niche topics such as disagreements with aging family members and probate and estate conflicts. Upon successful completion, Mediators Without Borders will award you four individual certificates in Mediation, Applied Mediation Practice, Family Mediation and Professional Family Mediator. A final exam is optional upon completion of the course. This course prepares you to sit for the InAccord Certified Mediator and Arbitrator exam. The exam is one of three parts to certification. The other requirements are role play practice which you will log as part of your applied practice course and the submission of surveys and other documentation from ten volunteer or live cases.

Topics in Colorado Agriculture: Conservation Agriculture

**Tuesday, December 1st
6-7:30 p.m. via Zoom \$45**

The U.S. drought monitor shows much of the lower Rocky Mountain region in drought with Colorado being one of the harder hit states.

Conservation agriculture explores a range of land management practices and technologies designed to improve drought and other field conditions.

Land management practices will include cover crop farming, the Conservation Reserve Program, and low-water crop alternatives.

Various technologies will be discussed including subsurface drip irrigation and precision agriculture. Precision agriculture uses GPS systems and drones to collect and analyze data from field conditions to improve production efficiency.
