
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Trinidad State College: President makes pitch for beginning or continuing your college education

The pandemic years have hifted traditional college-

going patterns as we once knew them. New high school graduates may have delayed college plans to take advantage of work opportunities, especially as employers were boosting starting wages in a tight job market.

Working adults may have stopped college to balance work while caring for young children as their schools shifted between in-person and remote learning. Whatever reason might have kept you from going to

college, I encourage you to consider coming back.

Years of economic data show that going to college has a high return-on-investment.

A 2021 study by the Georgetown Center on Education and the Workforce showed that higher levels of education generally result in higher lifetime earnings: from \$1.6 million for a high school diploma, to \$2 million for an associate degree, to \$2.8 million for a bachelor's degree.

We are also learning more about the benefits of adults returning to college. A recent study from Lightcast showed that adults were 22 % more likely to achieve upward mobility and earned annual salaries 140% greater than peers who didn't return to college. Adult learners earned an average of \$7,500 more per year after returning to college.

Here are some ways Trinidad State can make college even more financially feasible:

- 1) Concurrent enrollment: Earn college credit while still in high school at little or no cost.
- 2) Learn Local Scholarship: If you live in Las Animas, Huerfano, Alamosa, Costilla, Conejos, Rio Grande, Mineral

or Saguache counties, you will automatically receive a 20% discount when you register for 15 credit hours.

- 3) Merit scholarships: If you graduate high school with a 3.0 or higher you will automatically receive up to a 40% discount when you register for 15 credit hours
- 4) "Finish What You Started" Scholarship: Returning adults who have earned previous college credit or have experienced economic loss due to the pandemic can receive \$1,250 per semester in scholarships until you finish! Go to: www.trinidadstate.edu/cosi.
- 5) TSC Foundation scholarships: More than 60 scholarships are available for new and continuing students. Go to: www.trinidadstate.edu/scholarships.
- 6) Housing Scholarship: \$1,000 per academic year for full-time students.
- 7) Transfer/Bridge-to-Bachelor: Save up to \$6,000 per year by starting your degree at Trinidad State with guaranteed transfer to public universities in Colorado.
